I love being a pastor at Peace! This congregation continues to be a leader in our community and is known for its' reputation for showing Christ's love in so many different ways. Our members are constantly pushing the envelope of how to become more involved in our neighborhood, and our Staff continues to energetically accept each new idea and problem-solve each new challenge!

Staffing changes

The Staff at Peace is an amazing group of dedicated, creative people who are fun to work with! This year we were saddened by the passing of **Judy Kirkman**, who served as our Financial Secretary and Receptionist. She was a long-time participant in our Music Ministry as well. She is missed!

In the Office we welcomed **Gwen Snaza** to the Office Staff to serve as Receptionist and who has been learning the ropes to assist with our Financial Secretary duties. We also reluctantly said goodbye to **Bob Sterud** as our part-time custodian but have welcomed **Jose Nevarez-Maturin** to serve in that position.

We have also welcomed **June Gillepsie** to serve as our Library Coordinator, replacing **Kara Vehar** who stepped down from that position. We have also added **Audrey and Belinda Prostrollo** to serve as Worship Hosts, joining our existing team of Worship Hosts. And after serving as our Seniors Ministry Director, **Pat Steele** has decided to step down as we come into the New Year. We certainly appreciate her years of service in that position!

And finally we got to add a wonderful pastor to the Staff! **Pastor Alex Smith** arrived after Easter and has enthusiastically been getting to know the congregation. We have enjoyed her passion, warmth, and theological gifts.

Peace NEXT

What a difference one year can make! A year ago, we were in the middle of a Capital Campaign, and now construction has begun! Early in the year we retained the services of McGough Construction, a long-respected firm based in the Twin Cities who has moved into the Sioux Falls area. They have been a great partner to add to the team and have provided us with a Guaranteed Maximum Price for the cost of construction.

Another partner of the team is the Mission Investment Fund (MIF) of the ELCA. MIF has offered us a \$6.1 million loan, locking in a 3.875% rate for the next five years.


Due to the unprecedented rise in construction costs, we had to reduce the scope of Phase One. We decided to proceed with the new construction elements—the Family Activity Center and the Music Hub—and will hold back on remodeling and expanding the Gathering Area until a later date. Construction is scheduled to be completed the end of October of this year!

The financial support from the congregation has been amazing. The Capital Campaign generated gifts and pledges for the next two years totaling \$1.2 million. Some of those gifts were large one-time gifts. Many are ongoing monthly gifts. Interestingly, the monthly gifts are just the amount needed to finance the mortgage... roughly \$32,000 per month.

Pastor Jonathan and I are attending weekly construction meetings to stay up to date on the progress and provide input as needed. He has been key in helping to coordinate the construction schedule with our ministry schedule.

Rejuvenation Fund

One of the ways I have seen the Holy Spirit



The current balance of that fund is over \$250,000. Our goal is to retain a \$100,000 balance in that fund for emergency repairs. Funds in excess of that amount will be used for ongoing improvements. One of the ideas for 2023 is to use a portion of those monies to retain the services of TSP so that they can begin the design work for the remodeling and expanding of the Gathering Space. That way we will have a better idea of what our fundraising goal for that phase of the project that we had to put on hold.

Looking ahead

In the pages ahead you will learn about the significant ministry we did together this year, and the exciting directions we are headed in 2023!

I'll say it again: I love being a pastor at Peace Lutheran! This congregation is so passionate about the ministry God has call us to do, and the Church Council has provided insightful leadership at every turn! I am so blessed to get to work with such an amazing Staff each and every day, including three of the best pastors in the Synod! Thank you for the gift of serving you in 2022!

- We anticipate taking occupancy of the new building additions before this year is done

2022 also was remarkable on a personal note. In the summer, I completed a two-year Master of Business Administration in Non-Profit Leadership through Dakota Wesleyan University. This program gave me a wonderful opportunity for continuing education. I also accepted a role for the ELCA Youth Gathering in 2024. I will serve as the director for the tAble, an event for youth with disabilities. This is a ministry I have worked with over the last 20 years, and I am excited to take on event leadership. Plus, several extra trips to New Orleans mean fresh beignets.

All of this is to share better God's saving love and mercy through Christ Jesus. And that is key. This work and ministry we are about isn't about ourselves but about what God has done and revealing that hope to those around us.

This next year will have a few challenges as well. We continue to make sense of what has changed in the world as we settle into a new normal after the end of the pandemic. Life and relationships were hard for many people. It was easy to lose sight of where God had been at work. Now, continues to be the moment we have been called to lean into our faith and out into the world.

I want to thank Peace for the honor of serving as one of its' pastors. I don't take for granted the amazing place this community is. The impact of our ministry is felt throughout the community.

2022 Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes

The meeting was called to order by President Carissa Dice on January 30, 2022 There was a quorum of 50 or more members in attendance.

Pastor Stjernholm offered a prayer.

The minutes of the 2021 meeting were available in the annual report. Dan Elsasser moved to approve the minutes, and Gary Nelson seconded the motion. The minutes were approved by the members.

Treasurer Jamie Dooley reviewed the overview of our income and expenses. We went 11 months without a Faith Formation director, so staff expenditures were lower. Office expenses were a little over budget. Program expenses were cut back by the staff in 2021. Building expenses were over budget in utilities and property maintenance. We had an operating income of \$62,423.72. Last year the mortgage was paid off. The fund was renamed the rejuvenation fund. We currently have \$160,612.98 in the fund. Two air conditioning units were installed, cracks were sealed in the parking lot, and bathroom remodels all came from the rejuvenation fund in 2021. Tim Jensen moved to approve the treasurers report, and Dan Elsasser seconded the motion. The report was approved by the members.

The nominating team presented nominees for church council positions, the endowment team, and nominating team. A ballot was distributed with the positions and nominees. The nominees ran unopposed for all positions and were declared elected to their terms with unanimous consent. Cara Hetland volunteered to be on the nominating team.

Pastor Renae Boehmer provided an update on outreach ministries highlighting Stephen Ministries, prayer shawl ministry, Peace bus (now running 2 times on Sunday morning), new member process, and ELCA's Congregations Lead Initiative (welcoming others, making connections with others, and sharing stories).

Pastor Jonathan Vehar provided an update on in person and online worship attendance for 2021.

The percent of those worshipping at Peace online (from all over the country) has remained consistent throughout the year. Faith Formation has returned in person for children programing. Confirmation has added options including parental attendance once/month and an independent track called Peace University.

Pastor Paul Stjernholm presented on staffing changes, and we will have a special meeting February 6 to call a new pastor. Peace NEXT is raising funds for the addition and improvements to the church building. The goal is to raise \$1 million up front plus an addition \$375,000 in a 2 year period. We have raised approximately \$500,000 up front and \$190,000 in sustaining gifts. The project is estimated to cost \$7 million. The Capital Campaign will conclude at the end of February.

Treasurer Jamie Dooley presented the 2022 balanced budget with less than 1% increase. Staff expenses increased under 1%. Office expenses increased slightly over 1%. Building and Operating expenses increased by less than 1%. Dan Elsasser moved to approve the 2022 ministry plan and budget. This was seconded by Judy Kirkman. The budget was voted on by the members and was approved. There was no further discussion.

Pastor Renae closed in prayer.

Special Congregational Meeting

February 6, 2022

President Carissa Dice noted we had a quorum (of at least 50 members) and called the meeting to order with the purpose of voting on the Call Committee's recommendation for a new pastor.

Pastor Paul Stjernholm lead the congregation in prayer.

Joe Bunkers, member of the Call Committee, provided information about the process. After the applications were reviewed, the committee met with three applicants through a Zoom call and then in person. They were very pleased with each candidate. They determined who best aligned with the values of the congregation and would work well with our pastoral staff and decided to call Alexandra Smith. She is a graduate of Augustana University and Wartburg Theological Seminary. She has most recently served as a pastor in the Webster area. She also has experience in camp ministry including codirector at Camp NeSoDak. The committee valued her experience and openness to others. She seems to have the skills and desire to bring people together. They watched several of her messages and reviewed some of her writings. Questions were taken from the congregation.

A paper ballot vote was taken.

While the ballots were being counted, Pastor Paul spoke about the progress of the PeaceNEXT campaign to expand a gathering space and build a family resource center. A

team has been formed to interview and select a construction company. Invitations for proposals have been sent out to 4 different companies.

The Youth Gathering for this summer in Minneapolis has been cancelled. However, the youth will be able to take a mission trip during that same time to North Carolina through The Dwelling.

102 voted yes to call Pastor Alex to Peace, and 10 voted no. Since she is the only pastor at her current church, she would like to serve there through Lent and confirm the students of the current confirmation class. Then she would start at Peace after Easter.

Pastor Jonathan Vehar led the congregation in a closing prayer.

Since I was hired as library coordinator in October, my challenge has been to understand the mission of our church library and how best to move forward. This is God's library and a way for Him to minister to us through the written word. We have so many beautiful stories, inspiring devotionals, rich histories, books with new ideas and new viewpoints to explore in our library. There are boardbooks, picture books with timeless stories, and children's chapter books for families to share. There is a South Dakota history section and a section of books for young adults. We have so many volumes for people of all ages that bring Bible stories and today's stories to life and bring God's love into our hearts.

The question is, how to make all this more visible and accessible to all church members?

The answer is going online with our library catalog. We are currently in the process of adding our records to an online database, a process that may take up to a year but will soon be accessible to anyone using a phone, tablet or computer. If members register, they will be able to place holds on materials and check them out Wednesday nights or Sunday mornings when someone is in the library.

I am extremely grateful to all the folks who are volunteering their time and assistance to make this happen, and for all the support we receive from Lisa and the entire staff, especially Pastor Alex, who is most definitely our "possibility thinker"!

Endowment Team

The Peace Endowment offers a great opportunity to contribute to the present and future needs of Peace Lutheran Church. Contributions remain as principal in the Endowment into perpetuity, generating interest year after year. The Endowment grew over the course of the year with over \$8,000 of new gifts. Thank you for your contributions! However, with the general decline in the financial markets during 2022, the Endowment principal balance is now over \$152,000 – a decrease of approximately \$12,000 from last year's balance.

The Endowment's principal balance earns interest, which the Endowment Team uses to fund various ministries at Peace. In 2022, the Endowment financially supported scholarships for youth campers, a youth service trip to North Carolina, the youth gathering planning extravaganza, and education and improvement to Peace's neighborhood ministry.

Two ongoing missions of the Endowment Team are to seek ways to educate the congregation about planning future gifts to Peace Lutheran and to the Endowment, and to say "thank you" to those who have made donations. Along those lines, the team hosted an Endowment Dinner on Sunday, April 30th, at a downtown location complete with musical guests! At the dinner, the team was able to thank many of the Endowment's past donors and educate the group on the perpetual nature of gifts to the Endowment.

As always, all donations to the Endowment are welcome whether they be a few dollars or gifts from end-of-life estates.

Building and Administration

With every season, there is change and that has been true here at Peace Lutheran Church again in 2022.

- A few of the external lights in the parking lot required some wiring to be repaired as well as changing of light bulbs. When we do this we are making the switch over to LED lights. We are also continuing to switch the Church's fluorescent lights over to LED which has started to lower our electric bill each month. We are close to being 100% LED lit.
- The condensing unit in the Library broke down after running for over 20 years. We decided to replace the unit which, due to supply chain issues, took over four months to replace. Thank you to everyone who was patient through that process.
- New blacktop was added on west side to preserve our parking lot.
- The main bathrooms near the sanctuary were renovated and updated with new automated lights and fixtures, stalls, sinks and paint.
- We divided an office into two by putting up a wall, mudding, taping, painting and installing a new carpet. We are still waiting on a door and HVAC to be completed but are grateful for the additional space.

Most exciting for this year is the commencement of the music hub and family activity center additions. The plan is to have these two spaces functional by Fall 2023.

I would like to extend a note of thanks to all of our contractors and volunteers for the work each of you help cover. Major contractors are Broch Contracting (Snow removal); Travis Electric (electrical); Climate Control (HVAC); Mr. Rooter (plumbing); Roto-Rooter; and Tru-Green. Special thanks to the volunteers who have helped mow grass, remove snow, change lightbulbs and set up and tear down tables. Your support is truly appreciated!

Children's Ministry

Goals:

Our programs are built around the desire to help children experience God and clearly hear God's promises to them. By hearing God's story told in a variety of ways in Sunday school and worship, engaging in hands-on activities in small groups (sometimes with like-age peers and sometimes in inter-generational groups), and building relationships with others, God's love becomes more real to children.

2022

We continued to have a strong children's ministry program here at Peace. We have around 340 kids that we minister to. This year we have gone back to using the Narrative Lectionary which we used a few years back. We decided to come back to the Narrative Lectionary as this gives the kids more of an opportunity to connect with what they are doing in Sunday/Wednesday School, with what is happening in worship. One change that was made this year, is changing the curriculum that those in kindergarten through third grade use. Since this year in worship and with our educational programs, we went to using the Narrative Lectionary, this age group studies the same story that is being talked about in worship each week. Also, this age group this year, has a take-home family bag that has materials and most supplies to further their conversations on the stories each week at home as a family. It's a bag full of materials for five weeks. They bring the bag back and get it refilled for the next five weeks.

We were blessed to have had the ability to have our annual Children's Christmas program. We had a little over 60 kids participate by either playing in the prelude before the program, to acting, singing and learning lots of lines. The kids start learning the songs in September and with only 2 large group rehearsals, learn the whole program. A huge thanks to Darya Levesque who is the musical director and Bob Levesque for all the sound and technical work that he does and the many volunteers it takes from set-up to managing kids to tear down.

One of the highlights each year is our annual Vacation Bible School (VBS) event that happens at the end of June. We had about 300 kids attend either in the morning or in the evening. There is nothing better than to hear them singing all together in one place sharing their love for God and doing various activities to learn more about Him and all that He does for us.

We also took part in some community outreach programs this year. Our fourth and fifth graders made tie blankets for Project Warm Up, collected quarters for Church on the Street's (COTS) Laundry with Love program, filled Christmas stockings for them along with Easter bags and then collected food items for Western Heights.

With the offering money in the Giving Jar, we have been supporting an orphan in Liberia, purchased solar Bibles for the kids in Haiti along with soccer balls and provided needy families with Christmas gifts.

We are so blessed with the best families at Peace Lutheran! I can't thank you enough for your support, for the many volunteers it takes to make the program successful each week and for the best kids a program could ask for!

CONFIRMATION

Confirmation at Peace Lutheran Church begins in sixth grade and continues into the start of tenth grade when they are invited to participate in an Affirmation of Baptism Service on Reformation Sunday. 65 students affirmed their baptism this year!

Highlights from the program this year include:

- Bible Study our 6th grade students are doing a Bible overview this year! Through storytelling, creative reflection and dialogue, sixth graders are discovering familiar (and unfamiliar) stories through a new lens. In September, they went to Kids Against Hunger for a pack that went to those affected by Hurricane Ian.
- Small Catechism—our 7th-9th grade students are piloting project-based learning. It has been such a delight to engage with our students in more creative ways as they work through Luther's Small Catechism.
- Building Relationships in addition to connecting weekly with their confirmation small groups, students are encouraged to participate in the weekly youth group activities for high school students, monthly activities for middle school students, and/or week-long summer camp or mission trip experiences.
- Faith in Action all students are encouraged to get involved in volunteer service opportunities. Whether it is serving a meal at The Banquet, assisting with Vacation Bible School or Necessities for Neighbors here at church, or connecting in some other way in the community, students are encouraged to try a variety of volunteer experiences.

Life/Death Discussion – 10th graders and their parents participated in this conversation about creation/new life, life/choices/consequences and end of life/death. We modified the conversation this year to hold the entire conversation here at Peace, and included two community leaders (the pastor at St Dysmas, and a funeral director from Miller Funeral Home) in the event.

Thank you again to the parents, pastors, congregation members and leaders who are helping to ensure that the promises made to our youth in their baptisms are realized! For questions about Confirmation, contact Deacon Amanda Randall (traditional Wednesday programming) or Holly Marty (DIY Confirmation).

MIDDLE SCHOOL

In addition to weekly Confirmation activities, middle school students are invited to get involved in **Middle School First Fridays**. Activities this past year have included Faith Fest at Augustana University, ThunderRoad, Skate City, Bob Ross inspired Cocoa and Create, an escape room, Corn Maze, and a Christmas Party. If you'd like to help with planning, let me know!

HIGH SCHOOL

While some of our high school students (9th and first part of 10th grade year) are also involved in Confirmation, they are

also invited to weekly **High School Youth Group** on Sunday evenings. We started **High School Second Sundays** as well! We meet regularly for games, service activities, and to talk about faith in our daily lives. The laughter is endless and I am so thankful for each of our students here at Peace!

In July, 19 of our 8th-12th graders, 6 parents, Pastor Jonathan and I went to Winston-Salem, North Carolina. We served alongside students and adults from across the country at The Dwelling, a congregation that primarily serves people experiencing homelessness, incarceration, mental illness, etc. It was a transformative experience for all of us. We served at different organizations in the community alongside members of The Dwelling and took a pilgrimage through the margins, which was based on the lived experience of our Dwelling Counselors. Our evenings were filled with worship, fun activities, and time together. Thank you to all who supported and prayed for our journey!

As we look ahead, we are planning for the next **National Youth Gathering** (NYG) in 2024! We will head to New Orleans, Louisiana for a time of worship, servant projects and connecting with fellow Lutherans. This is open to all **current 7th-11th grade students.** We even have floor seats for one night of worship! Interested in attending or being a small group leader? Let me know!

Summer Camps have been a staple part of the children and youth ministry here at Peace. Peace again had many campers enjoy time at Outlaw Ranch, Klein Ranch and NeSoDak. We look forward to another summer of fun and encountering God!

Study materials are taken from the WELCA Gather magazine for both circles. There are also the Peace Quilters, Peaceful Stampers, and the Prayer Shawl groups for you to join. Please pick up a Womens' Ministries Booklet at the Welcome Center to get the contact names and numbers for each of these groups.

Many thanks to Holly Marty for organizing the Women's Advent Gathering "The Gifts of Christmas" in December! Prior to the event, many Christmas gifts and funds for haircuts for the residents at the nearby Good Samaritan Village were collected, along with giving them a WELCA donation. Thanks also to Bev Philliber and Diane Feller for using Thrivent Action Grants and collecting the donations and to Bev for delivering the items to Good Sam Village on Marion Road. There were also collections for the local VOA Veterans Outreach Center, and winter wear for local school children, along with a check for each to purchase more items. Thrivent Action Grants supplemented the collections. We are grateful to Dianne Feller for coordinating and delivering the donations and the purchase of items for both of these worthwhile projects!

The Prayer Shawl group made 144 shawls for those needing comfort. 20 were sent to the Good Sam Village, and 60 went to Sanford Hospice/Ava's House. Church on the Street received 1,200 pocket prayer shawls! The rest of the shawls are available to members and pastors for those in need of them throughout the year.

The Quilting group made 236 quilts! They were distributed to Lutheran World Relief (160), Children's Inn (24), the Church on the Street (28), Glory House (12), and the VOA Veterans Outreach Center (12). Peace Quilters sold lefse in November, and had their Quilt/Craft sale in December to raise money to purchase supplies needed for more quilts. Thanks to all who supported this mission.

Peace WELCA honored Deb Patzlaff for all her work putting funeral lunches together. Due to a new job, Deb is no longer available to do all the personal requests for funeral cakes/volunteers. We now have a Funeral Committee (Marilyn Boese, Shireen Ranschau, Mary Quanbeck, Arlene Sorenson, and Betty Fokken) who lined up and coordinated volunteers and cakes for the rest of the 16 funerals during 2022, with 1,707 people served last year. Leftover food was given to the families/friends, or taken to St. Francis House or other charities as per the wishes of the families.

The Love Offering funds were supplemented by many \$250 Thrivent Action Teams applied for by WELCA members, providing thousands more in donations. Because of the generous support from the congregation, Peace WELCA was able to support the following organizations/projects in 2022: *240 Towels for Lutheran World Relief for personal care kits for Ukrainians, funds for gas for Bread Break/a non-profit that collects day old breads from bakeries and grocery stores to distribute to those in need such as at Food to You, *Good Samaritan Village Hair Cuts and Christmas gifts, *VOA Veteran's Outreach Center, *Winter wear and other items for local school kids, Pueblo de Dios Vacation Bible School, *Peace Families Christmas Gifts, Necessities for Neighbors, Family Visitation Center, St. Dysmas Christmas projects, SOS (Supply Our Students/school supplies), Peace Pastor Appreciation gifts, Peace VBS, Lunch is Served, the youth mission trip to NC, the Family Connection, and Nicaragua ministries through the SD Synod. The largest gift was for \$3,000 for Peace Lutheran Campers. WELCA also headed up collections of items or additional funds from Thrivent Action Teams for the projects marked by an asterisk. Thank you to the congregation, the women of WELCA, and others who gave generously to support these causes!

Charis Ministry Partners





Greetings Charis partners, as another year comes to an end I would like to take this opportunity to once again thank you for all the ways you have supported these ministries in 2022. Without your support, we would not be able to continue to help so many in our community every month with items that are needed for basic living.

In July we were able to move our Food to You distributions back inside. This change allowed us to do a few different things, it gave us the ability to distribute the food better depending on family size instead of every family getting the same box of food no matter what their size; it gave the guests back their ability to make choices on different items they would prefer such as kinds of cereal, meat or soup; and it helped us to bring the ministry aspect back to the program. Bringing the distributions back indoors meant that not only would the guests be able to socialize with each other, it meant that our volunteers would be able to interact with and visit with the guests as well. It's been two years since we've been inside and some of our volunteers had never experienced our indoor distribution before, so this has helped them understand that we do far more than hand out food. The love and kindness we show to all who come through our lines is sometimes the best part of their day we've been told. Our distribution numbers for 2022 were up almost 900 families from 2021, from 3746 families in 2021 to 4634 in 2022.

In June we moved our Necessities for Neighbors distributions inside as well. This move allowed us to be able to move back to a system where we were able to register families and bring back the ministry aspect as well. Our guests have seemed to be happy with the changes and the opportunity to come back inside. We are always looking for different ways to connect with our guests and for ministry partners that would have services that they may be interested in. We had a woman that worked with a service offering free preschool for families that came to all of the Necessities for Neighbors and Food to You distributions for a month and visited with families, signing up any family that was interested in their services. Our distribution numbers for 2022 were down almost 1300 families from 2021, from 4519 in 2021 to 3528 in 2022.

Towards the end of 2022 the Charis board made the difficult decision to put our Healthy Rides program into a "hibernation" state. COVID changed everything for Healthy Rides, while the need for these rides had always been there, the ability to give those rides by Project CAR was not there. They had other customers that they were contracted to give rides to, but those customers ceased during COVID, so they were able to give more rides to our guests. The number of "health rides" skyrocketed. For years they had been giving 70-90 rides per month, but then it started climbing to 200, 300, and some months over 350. Both Avera and Sanford have been funding this program through grants since its inception, and so when the numbers started going up we did request an increase in the grant amount. However, the amount we received was not enough to be able to fund the program for another year. Project CAR submitted a request to Charis to take over the program under a different name "Rides for Wellbeing" which the board agreed with and we then put Healthy Rides to sleep, for now.

The main reason we moved our distributions back inside was to bring the ministry aspect back, that's what sets us apart from all the other "give-aways". A prime example of this happened at one of our Food to You distributions when one of our regular guests came up to us before the distribution started and explained that he was a diabetic and his blood sugar was dangerously low. He asked if we could find him anything to eat or drink, to help get his blood sugar back up, immediately I asked for some examples and then I went into the next room where we were setting up for the distribution and grabbed some food and juice for him. I brought it back to his table, opened it for him and told him that if he needed anything else to let me know. I checked on him a few minutes later to see if he needed anything else and he was eating and drinking, but said he was good and thanked me. When he came through to register he said he was feeling much better and thanked us for taking such great care of him. The following month when we were back at that location, this gentleman came up to me before we started to thank me again for taking such great care of him the previous month and to give me a donation. This man with so little gave me a monetary donation towards our ministry and it brought me to tears. This is why we do what we do, this is how we are different, we treat our guests like people and they know we truly care about them.

Again, I thank you for your partnership this year and I look forward to another year in service.

Dear Church on the Street Ministry Partners,

Your faithful generosity in prayer, kits, visits, quilt making, laundry pods, quarters, transporting donations, fundraising, Thrivent Action Teams, making and serving meals, telling the story, and making sure the good news of Jesus resurrection is known in hugs, tears, words, and clean laundry is remarkable. God's work is being done by a whole community by being Church together. Thank you for all so very much!

It is a joy for me to share what God is up to at Church on the Street, and I love getting to visit organizations and congregations all over the state and even in neighboring states! Frequently, a few lay leaders are able to join me. After a visit this summer, one of them leaned over and said, "I love hearing our story." And, in case you didn't know it, our story includes you! It is a story of God calling together a community that worships, serves, and walks together with those experiencing homelessness and poverty in Sioux Falls.

Here is a snapshot of who we are and what we do as a church:

- We worship monthly (6 months in the park & 6 months in the Multicultural Center)
- Our Laundry with Love ministry provides free laundry for families, a meal, new underwear, and fellowship
- We provide pastoral care at the Bishop Dudley Hospitality House, weekly
- We take countless walks to meet people where they are
- We ensure that folks are fed through our pantry and Fruits of the Freezer
- We collect, and pray over prayer requests are shared and prayed over and send them out to partners like you (email me chiral@churchonthestreet.org to join those who pray for our individuals)

Because of you, we can better meet the growing needs in our community. We're relocating our annual Health and Healing event to include more ways for people to experience wellness through screenings and checks - in addition to feeling a bit more dignity through haircuts and new family photos.

We continue to have excellent staff and regular volunteers who work hard and deeply love the Church on the Streeters. When we gather for worship, in the laundry mat, or even on visits, someone is always handing me a little bit of food they got from a food giveaway or some warm clothing they won't be eating or using and tells me to pass it along to someone who needs it. Generosity abounds at Church on the Street!

We say it often because it is true - It's great to be Church together!

Together we do God's work and reach out to one another with hope and love. This hard, holy work is a blessing to so many. Thank you.
